LAND REGISTRATION

The Scottish Law Commission is engaged in a review of the system of land registration in Scotland. Two discussion papers setting out proposals for reform were published in February 2004 (No 125) and August 2005 (No 128). A third and final discussion paper is published today. In **Discussion Paper on Land Registration: Miscellaneous Issues (No 130)** the Scottish Law Commission makes proposals for reform in respect of a number of further matters, including descriptions and boundaries, servitudes, overriding interests, and decision-making by the Keeper of the Registers of Scotland.
